A Message from 2025 Board President Courtney Linam



Each year, United Way of Etowah County touches the lives of thousands, providing vital resources to those in need. It is an honor to serve as the 2025 Board President and continue this legacy of service. Our community is filled with incredible people and organizations working every day to create positive change, and United Way is at the heart of that effort.

United Way of Etowah County is more than an organization, it is a movement of people who believe in supporting one another.

Whether through education, financial stability, or health initiatives, we are committed to ensuring that individuals and families have the resources they need to succeed. But we cannot do it alone. The challenges our community faces cannot be overcome without a collective effort.

One example of how our community is stepping up to meet these challenges is the Girlfriend Gala, a fundraiser to support the Dolly Parton Imagination Library. Through this program, children in Etowah County receive an age-appropriate book each month until their fifth birthday, fostering a love of

reading and early literacy skills. In 2024 alone, we delivered over 18,800 books to nearly 1,300 local children, and that number continues to grow. Programs like this ensure that the next generation has the tools they need to thrive.

We also see firsthand how 211/First Call for Help is changing lives. A local hospital recently called to thank us, sharing how one of their patients came in very sick and overwhelmed with stress about being out of work and unable to pay their bills. The hospital staff encouraged the patient to call 211, and by the next day, they saw a dramatic change. The patient was in good spirits, relieved to have been connected with agencies that could help pay rent, utilities, and provide food until they were well enough to return to work. This is the kind of real, lifechanging impact that United Way and our partners make possible.

Our strength comes from the passion and dedication of the UWOEC staff, our dynamic and engaged board, the generosity of our donors, and the unwavering support of our local businesses and volunteers. Together, we are making a meaningful impact by addressing critical needs and expanding resources for families.

Through initiatives like Student Success, 211/First Call for Help, and the Day of Action, we will continue providing essential resources, guidance, and opportunities that empower individuals and families. As we look ahead, we hope to build on these efforts by fostering even stronger partnerships and expanding opportunities to serve, but we can only do that with continued community support.

EDUCATION: 4-H













towah County 4-H aims to empower youth with the skills necessary to become confident adults and community leaders. In 4-H children develop essential life skills by engaging in hands-on projects across various domains such as science, health, agriculture, and

leadership. Our "learn by doing" approach fosters confidence, independence, resilience, and compassion. In 2024 over one thousand Etowah County Youth benefitted from 4-H programming through classroom clubs, afterschool clubs, 4-H Camp, independent projects, and enrichment activities.

FINANCIAL STABILITY: Darden Rehabilitation Foundation



arden Rehabilitation Foundation (DRF), founded in 1957, is a Community Rehabilitation Program. The Alabama Department of Rehabilitation Services contracts with DRF to provide Community Employment Services to people who have a mental, physical, and/or addiction disability in the counties of Cherokee, Dekalb, Etowah, Marshall, and St. Clair. In addition to being a United Way Agency, Darden Rehabilitation Foundation is required to be Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) Certified to receive state funds. CARF certification takes place every three years.

Darden Rehabilitation Foundation provides the following Community Employment Services:

- Vocational Evaluation
- Job Preparation
- Job Development
- Employment Retention
- On the Job Evaluation (OJE)
- Supported Employment

- Driver Education
- Job Exploration Training (JET)
- Pre-Employment Transition Services Darden Rehabilitation Foundation uses the United Way Funds in the driver education program. United Way Funds help with the salaries of three-part time instructors, maintenance, and gas for two cars that are equipped with a brake and accelerator on the passenger side. The 2024 United Way Funds helped in the purchase of a new Toyota Corolla Cross SUV for the Driver Education Program. Darden's driver education teachers take consumers to the Department of Motor Vehicle to take the written and driving test. The consumers drive one of Darden's cars for the road test. Driver education helps Darden consumers become Job Ready. Many consumers benefit from individual and/or small group instruction. During FY24, 73 Darden consumers obtained their Learner Permit, and 78 consumers obtained their driver license.

HEALTH: Council on Aging



he Council on Aging (COA) has served Senior Citizens in Etowah County for more than 37 years. Our Mission has always been to enhance the quality of life of the aging persons living in Etowah County. Our vision is to ensure all seniors age 55 and older or 50 and disabled are provided with education and resources to be safe and healthy in mind, body and soul. Our core values are compassion, commitment, responsiveness and involvement. We are a small non-profit, but we make a huge impact in our community.

The Council on Aging has several programs available to our older Americans. One is our Be Active Campaign program. This program encourages our aging population to be active both physically and mentally. Studies indicate that people who engage in meaningful, productive activities tend to live longer and experience better physical and mental health. COA offers regular activities for our older community members including club meetings, health and wellness classes, crafts, games and more

Our Senior Outreach program helps seniors make informed decisions about healthcare through the State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP). We provide general Medicare information, Medicare enrollment assistance, and referrals for resources and senior service providers. This program also offers dentures to low-income seniors without dental insurance, senior RX for prescriptions and out-of-county transportation to Dr's appointments on Thursdays.

The Council on Aging (COA) along with the Alabama Securities Commission (ASC), Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP), and other organizations advocate and educate seniors and caregivers on how to recognize and prevent Elder Abuse and Fraud. We do this by hosting an annual Elder Abuse Summit and Caregivers Summit. Our EGMAP program is designed to train guardians and conservators appointed by the Etowah County Office of Probate and monitor the wards (incapacitated individuals) to make sure the ward is safe from harm.

In June of 2024, The Council on Aging moved into the new Gadsden Senior Wellness Center. We are very fortunate to have this opportunity. The picture above is from the grand opening. SAFETY NET: DHR



he Department of Human
Resources traces its history
back to the Department of Child
Welfare, an agency created by the
Legislature in 1919 to serve at-risk children
and families. During the Great Depression in
1933, the department gained the additional
responsibility of administering financial
assistance to a struggling American public.
In 1935 with the passage of the Social
Security Act, the department and most
of its duties were absorbed by the newly
created Department of Public Welfare.

In 1955, the department was renamed the Department of Pensions and Security. The current name was adopted in 1986. Some programs have changed over the years to meet the evolving needs of Alabama. However, the agency's primary goal has always been and always will be to help people in need.

Today, the mission of DHR is to provide for the protection, well-being, and self-sufficiency of children and adults. The Child and Family Services Division provides services based on the philosophy that children should be protected from abuse and neglect and, whenever possible, families should be preserved and strengthened to nurture and raise children in safe, healthy, and stable environments.

Vulnerable adults should also be protected from various forms of abuse, neglect or exploitation and should be assisted to live independently within their own communities for as long as possible instead of unnecessary institutionalization.

Service interventions are based on a set of beliefs about outcome-based practice that is both strengths-based, family focused, and individualized, meaning services are determined by an individual's own unique strengths, needs, and cultural identity.

During the last year, Etowah County assessed 828 reports of child abuse/ neglect and 272 prevention reports. From those reports, 239 children entered foster care with another 257 children not in foster care initiating services. 335 reports of adult abuse/neglect/ exploitation were also assessed with 97 of those adults needing cases opened for further assistance. It is through ongoing collaboration with the community to have a continuum of services and resources that are comprehensive, seamless, readily accessible, unique, and able to meet differing levels of need that the agency is able to adequately support parents in raising their children as well as adults seeking to maintain their independence.

2024 IMPACT AT A GLANCE



Education GOAL: Create better opportunities for our children to reach their full potential

OUTCOMES: 20,400 books were provided to 1,650 children birth to five years of age through the Dolly Parton Imagination Library. 1,197 girl volunteers participated in Girl Scout programming. 85 youths were served through Big Brothers/Big Sisters,16 schools were served, 4,874 volunteer mentoring hours. 98% of youth surveyed showed improvement in social acceptance, scholastic competence, education expectations, and grades, attitudes towards risky behaviors, parental trust, and having a special adult in their life. 240 boys were served through Boy Scouts, Greater AL. 376 youths were served through Boys and Girls Club.

GOAL: Help people build a solid financial
future so our entire community can flourish

OUTCOMES: 220 consumers received training at Darden Rehabilitation center. 1,801 persons received the services of the Financial Stability Coach and 5.410 people received educational sessions. 97% reported having improved confidence.145 credits were recovered for students through the Gadsden Community Education program.

Safety Net



GOAL: Respond to the basic needs of the community

OUTCOMES: There were 256 primary child victims served for a total of 262 specialized forensic interviews. 213,569 victims.13,117 clients were served with food, over 28,000 meals and 1,200 bags for the homeless.135 children received basic needs after being removed from the home. 7,516 shelter nights were provided and 13,549 meals. More than 25,500 referrals were given to community resources, over 8,336 connections were made to housing and utility needs. More than 3,523 connections to food were made. 164 individuals were helped with utilities, rent and mortgage. 100% were given the tools to establish and maintain a successful spending plan. 100% were given resources to help them achieve short and long term goals.
